Does China have the ability to carry out a successful preemptive missile strike against US and allied defenses in Asia? In this article, Thomas Shugart and Javier Gonzalez analyze China's ballistic missile capabilities to answer this question and they contend their findings are deeply concerning. Indeed, they suggest their simulation of an attack reveals the potential for a devastation of US power projection forces and bases in the region.

[The Risks and Rewards of Thucydides' History of the Peloponnesian War](#)

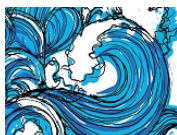

In this text, Jaffe responds by 1) sketching out his interpretation of the character and purpose of Thucydides' 'History of the Peloponnesian War'; and 2) discussing what lessons this great work still has to teach us, including about US-China relations.

['Diaspora as Partners': The Canadian Model of Countering Violent Extremism](#)

In this article, Geoff Burt and Matt Cohen highlight what lessons governments can learn from Canada's countering violent extremism (CVE) strategy to combat against homegrown terrorism. These lessons include 1) that governments must actively support engagement and dialogue, including between communities and national security actors; 2) that law enforcement approaches must balance conventional counterterrorism activities with efforts to engage with diaspora communities, and more.

[Effective Maritime Domain Awareness in the Western Indian Ocean](#)

Accurate knowledge of maritime activities is vital for maritime security and economic development. This is a problem for the Western Indian Ocean, argues Christian Bueger, as the region has no reliable provider of such information. So what can be done to improve the situation? After reviewing the current state of affairs in the region, Bueger outlines that the answer may lie in, among other things, 1) simple low-tech

solutions; 2) increased investment in key human resources; and 3) better coordination between regional maritime security programs and other initiatives.
